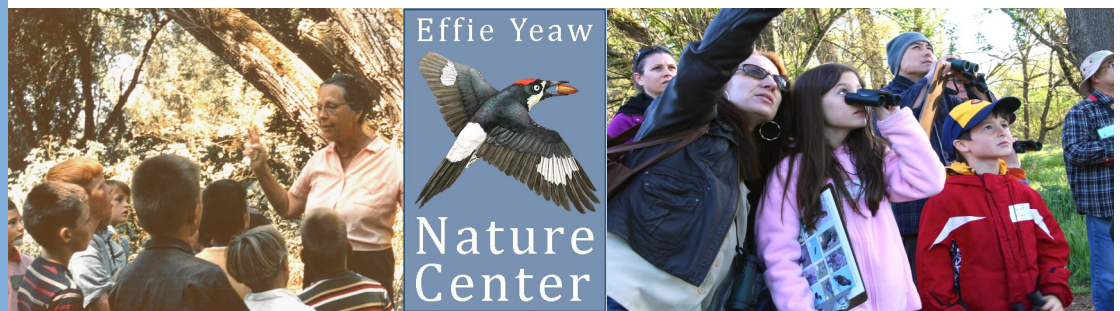

Another year has passed, and the Effie Yeaw Nature Center continues to provide the highest quality nature education programs in the Sacramento area. Programs provided to schools give children the opportunity to experience many aspects of nature up close, for some, for the first time. This kind of enrichment makes learning so much more fun and stays with students long after the experience.

Camps offer more experiences that connect young people to the natural world where they live. When I walk through the camp area, especially when parents are picking up their campers, the excitement of the children telling about what they have learned confirms that we are on the right path.



We didn't forget the adults this year. An expanded Nature of Things series gave lifelong learners the opportunity to discover new skills and broaden their ways of being a part of nature. Bird watching, photography, and so much more bring adults closer to nature. Both of our UC Davis Naturalist program offerings sold out again this year.

The planning process for improving our 43 year old facilities continues. Our talented committee is working with other agencies and businesses to put together a vision for the short term and long haul. We have sought a grant from the Lower American River Conservancy for funding to begin in depth planning, which, includes reaching out to our members and the community for input and participation. I have learned that this is a very complex and sometimes lengthy process but will be well worth the effort because it will make our educational and visitor experience so much richer.

Two members of the board stepped down after giving great service. We thank Dick Laursen and Peggy Kennedy for their service and dedication. In their stead, we welcomed Laurie Weir onto the board and are looking forward to adding Margaret Leavitt and Carye Colangelo for the coming year. This board is so amazing. I am awed by the talent, intelligence and passion for nature and the environment that each board member brings.

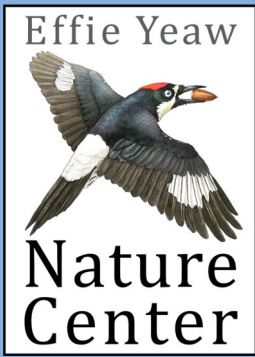

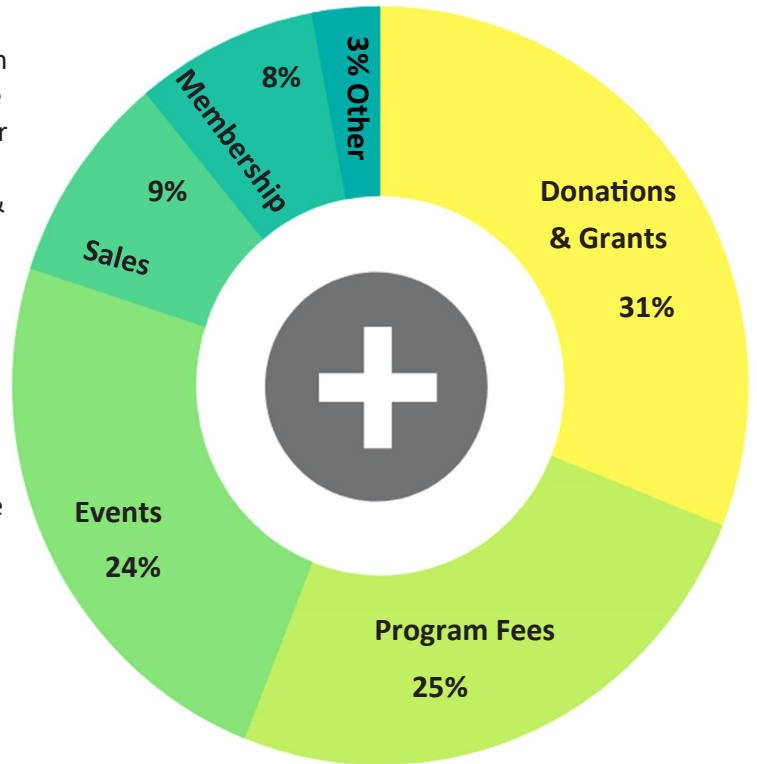

Revenue & Expenses 2018-2019

Revenue: \$746,966

ARNHA saw a solid year of growth in fiscal year 2018-2019. Revenue was up 2% from the previous year and there was a substantial gain in revenue from Spring Art Gala & Auction, NatureFest, and Bird & Breakfast. Each of these events were incredibly successful bringing in one fourth of our revenue, while simultaneously providing an avenue for education and informing our community.

Program Fees and Other Revenue also saw solid increases. Small decreases in membership, donations, and sales will be areas of growth and improvement for ARNHA in the coming year. ARNHA continues to focus on careful planning and future growth of the Effie Yeaw Nature Center, which will bolster future revenues.

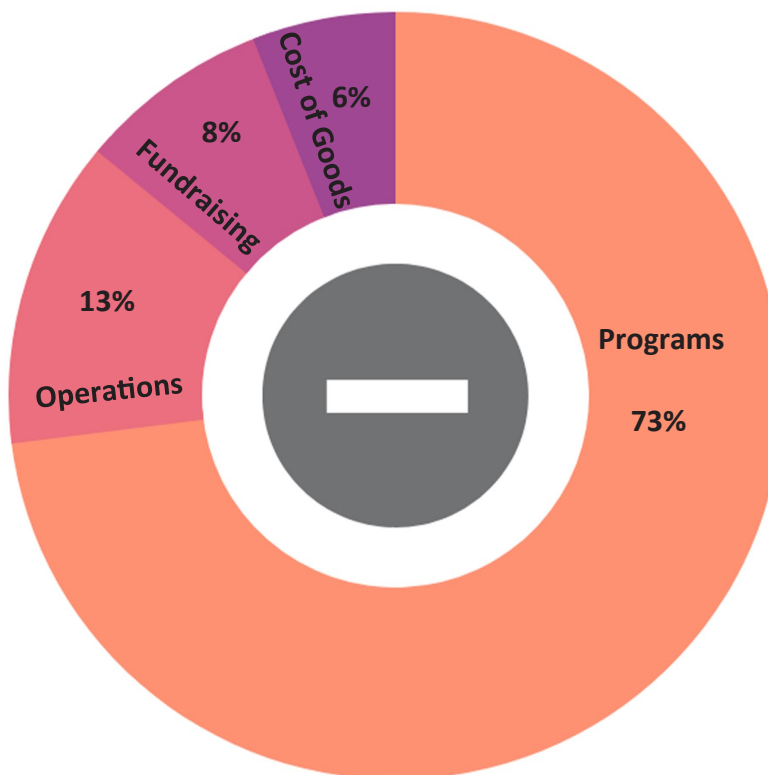


Expenses: \$700,811

In the 2018-2019 fiscal year, ARNHA experienced a substantial decrease of 7% in expenses over the previous year. This is a great accomplishment and a goal we will continue to strive for. The decreases in expenditures were in operations and fundraising. Closely monitoring funds and applying cost saving measures contributed to this success.

Program costs increased and continue to be the largest category of expense for ARNHA. These expenses allow ARNHA to deliver its mission through the Effie Yeaw Nature Center and include school and weekend programs, as well as the care of our nearly 30 resident Animal Ambassadors.

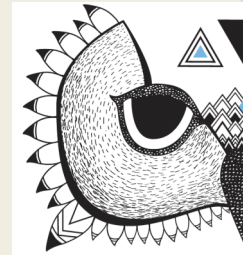
The 2018-2019 balanced budget approved by ARNHA is reflected in the success of revenues exceeding expenses. The approved budget for 2019-2020 is also a balanced budget and we expect to see continued success in revenues exceeding expenses for the coming year.

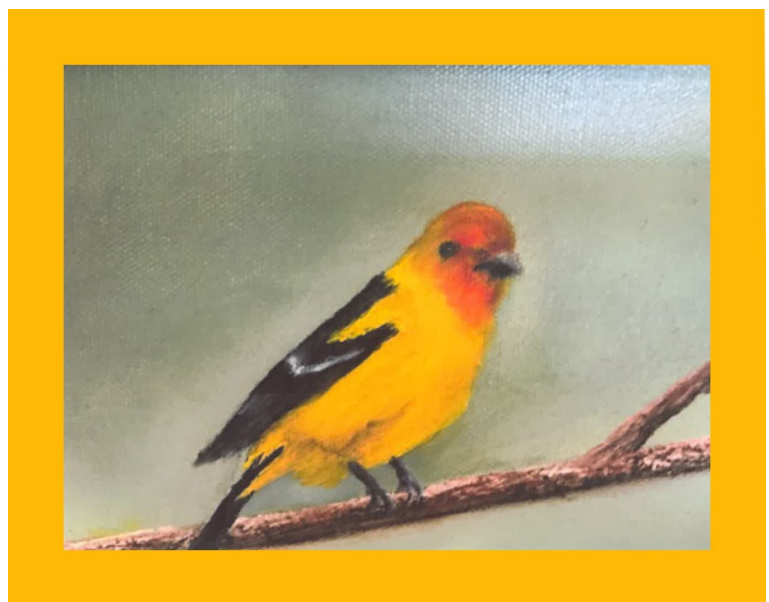

Our fiscal year ended with the loss of Tango, the Western Tanager. It is always difficult when one of our animal ambassadors passes away. However, in the wake of our sadness an unexpected gift arrived. Visitors began sharing their stories about Tango and the ways he touched their lives.

Peggy shared an image of a painting she created of Tango. Sue shared a favorite video of Tango taking an exuberant bath. One of the most powerful stories came from a frequent visitor and her son. Longtime lovers of nature, Amy and Fenn had never showed an especially strong interest in birds, but Tango changed that. After meeting Tango, they began to sit and watch him on the back porch for extended periods of time, listening to his song, and watching the tilt of his head as he studied them in return. Amy and Fenn would become so enamored with Tango that they took a week long bird language workshop and found themselves searching the trees for more feathered friends.

We are lucky enough to witness the impact of an up-close encounter with one of our animal ambassadors on a regular basis- the twinkle in the eye of a student as Echo, the Great Horned Owl, emerges from her carrier, the smile of pride as a nervous visitor overcomes their fear and touches one of our snakes, the nod of agreement that wildlife and their habitat deserves to be protected. But hearing how one little songbird created such a legacy is both comforting and inspiring.

2019-2020 promises to bring excitement as we make improvements to several of our enclosures and welcome new animal ambassadors into their forever home. We thank you for supporting these animal ambassadors and their role of connecting our community to the wonderful wild that lives alongside them.

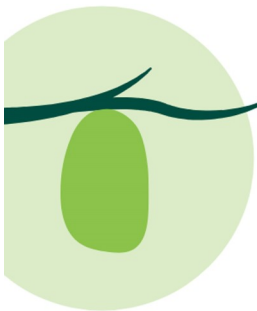
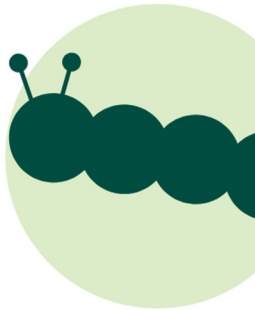

The Nature Center's Urban Nature Program brings the benefits of environmental education to local low-income schools at no cost to them. These are classrooms that can rarely afford a visit from a naturalist with a live animal or an educational trip away from their school without funding support. Over 4,000 children had the opportunity to touch a snake or see a raptor up-close, and consider the impact of the American River on all of our lives. Grants and individual donor support make it possible for Title I and underserved schools to visit the Nature Center or receive nature programs in their classrooms for free.

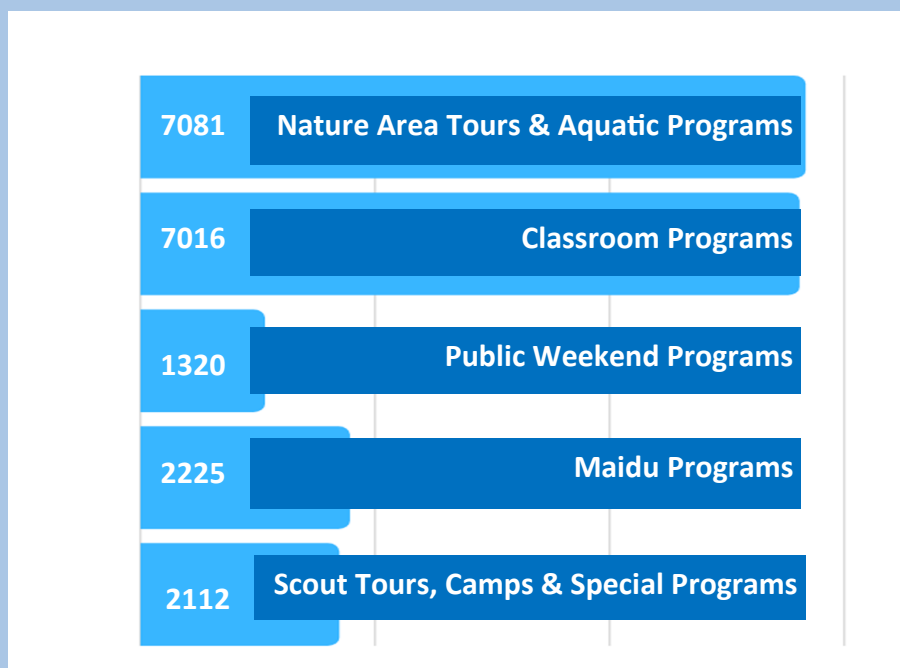

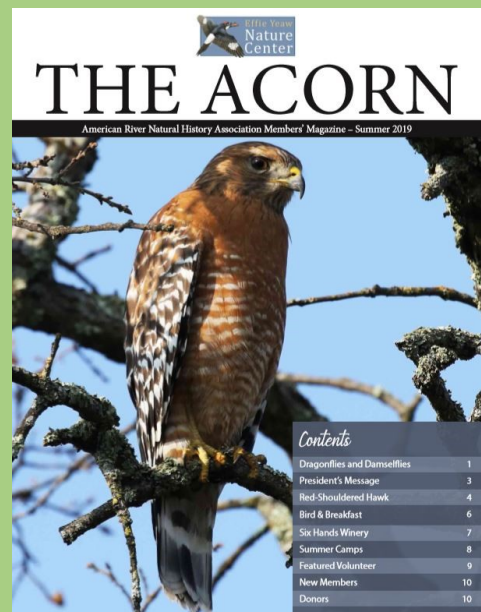

Our Volunteers: The Heart of the Center

This last fiscal year, over 235 volunteers kept the Nature Center open by greeting visitors, leading tours, keeping trails clean, working on exhibits, caring for our resident wildlife through daily maintenance, special projects, landscaping and habitat restoration, clerical work and data entry, leading school tours and helping with Nature Camps, assisting with fundraising, planning and hosting special events including our annual Gala and Nature Fest, writing, social media engagement, publishing, and distributing books and our quarterly newsletter, and other activities to support the Nature Center's mission of bringing people to nature and nature to people.

Total volunteer hours topped 15,250 this year! According to the Independent Sector (http://www.independentsector.org/volunteer_time), volunteer time in California, as of 2019, is valued at \$29.95/hour. **At this rate, our volunteers supported EYNC this fiscal year with over \$456,737 – that is almost one million dollars!**
